In Memory of John Edward Beltz June 23, 1923-October 31, 2013

A teacher and a lawyer, John led a rich and varied life.

John was passionate about the environment. He founded the Right to Quiet Society at a time when few were aware of acoustic pollution; he was active in the establishment of Friends of Cypress Provincial Park Society; he called for action against coal-bed methane gas extraction in the Similkameen Valley.

As a child John lived in Indonesia and became fluent in Dutch and Indonesian. He attended high school in Lausanne, Switzerland, where schooling was in French and where he learned German as well. He returned to Vancouver at the outbreak of World War 11 to complete high school and went on to UBC. After graduating from UBC in 1943 John joined the US navy. He was assigned to Indonesia in 1945 where his language skills in Dutch and Indonesian were invaluable. An exciting early life!

While John loved to travel in Europe, in Germany and France in particular, he was also happy to be "at home" in North Vancouver and in Princeton. Until the last few years he walked, preferably uphill, every day.

Invasive Plants - New Year's Resolutions

Being as though it's a new year, I thought it would be appropriate to start the year with a list of resolutions that you may wish to consider for 2014. Rest assured it has nothing to do with weight loss, more exercise or stopping smoking (not that those aren't good things to resolve to do)!

It's essentially a summation of the best means of reducing invasive plants in the Okanagan-Similkameen region and improving the overall health of our natural habitats and agricultural areas. It will also help us save lots of money, because remember, invasive plants in crops and pastures alone costs Canada approximately \$2.2 billion annually.

Whether you've battled bindweed in your backyard, picked hound's-tongue seeds off your pants or noticed the increase in knapweed in our grasslands, you've become aware of the spread of invasive plants. Invasive plants are a problem, but often the solutions are relatively straightforward. Take the time to read through these top twelve resolutions and chose at least one that you can strive to achieve in 2014

- 1. Learn to identify invasive plants growing in the Okanagan-Similkameen region. Peruse our website to view the complete list and download information sheets: www.oasiss.ca
- 2. Report sightings of new invaders in our region or patches of common species in remote locations where they may go undetected.
- 3. When gardening, choose plants wisely. Be suspicious of plants promoted as "fast spreaders" or "vigorous self-seeders." Do not transplant aggressive species that are known to be invasive. Instead, select native plants that are adapted to our local ecosystems or non-invasive ornamental species.
- 4. Avoid using exotic wildflower seed mixes.
- 5. Be wary of wild birdseed mixes. Carefully select the seed mix or create the mix yourself. Put the seed mix on cookie sheets and bake to prevent germination. In the spring, remove any unusual plants growing under or near your bird feeder, before the plant goes to seed.
- 6. Dispose of invasive plants carefully. Do not 'recycle' garden debris or compost. Properly dispose in trash bags or by drying out any material to destroy remaining vegetative parts.
- 7. Avoid letting invasive plants fruit or set seed, as birds and animals can spread the plants to other areas. Deadhead flowers, seedpods and berries of known invasive plants.
- 8. Reduce soil disturbances and re-seed disturbed soils with a suitable seed mix.
- 9. Avoid picking plants from roadsides, gravel pits or other disturbed areas.
- 10. When exploring the great outdoors, check your vehicle, boat, bike, camping gear, shoes and pets for invasive plant seeds that may have hitched a ride. Dispose of any seeds carefully.
- 11. Encourage friends and neighbours to learn more about invasive plants, and share information that you have learned such as how to identify a certain species.
- 12. Get involved with local efforts to control invasive plants.

Saturday, January 4th, 2014

15 participated in the Christmas Bird Count

About half were from the VFFN and the rest from the Okanagan

It was a very cold, (minus 14) morning so very few birds were seen in the morning, but it picked up considerably in the afternoon. There was a total of 55 species.

We had pizzas and read our results to the group in the Arts Council room which worked very well.

This was Madelon's last year to organize the CBC. Cathie and Amanda LaHaie have very kindly volunteered to take over this job next year.

AND the COUNT was as follows: by Cathy Lahaie

The total number of birds counted was 1971 in 54 species. There were 13 people in the field and 2 feeder watchers.

Our totals are as follows: Mallards 32, Common Goldeneye 4, Barrow's Goldeneye 12, Hooded Merganser 1, Common Merganser 5, Ring-necked Pheasant 1, Ruffed Grouse 4, Bald Eagle (adult) 19, Bald Eagle (immature) 8, Sharp-Shinned Hawk 1, Cooper's Hawk 1, Red-tailed Hawk 6, Rough-Legged Hawk 4, Golden Eagle (adult) 1, Golden Eagle (immature) 2, Rock Pigeon 3, Eurasian Collared Dove 46, Mourning Dove 10, Northern Pygmy Owl 2, Belted Kingfisher 3, Downy Woodpecker 7, Hairy Woodpecker 16, Three-Toed Woodpecker 1, Northern Flicker (red-shafted) 26, Pileated Woodpecker 5, Northern Shrike 4, Gray Jay 6, Steller's Jay 47, Clark's Nutcracker 83, Black-billed Magpie 63, American Crow 104, Common Raven 546, Black-capped Chickadee 15, Mountain Chickadee 180, Red-breasted Nuthatch 73, White-breasted Nuthatch 22, Pygmy Nuthatch 60, Brown Creeper 1, American Dipper 12, Townsend's Solitaire 1, American Robin 9, Varied Thrush 1, European Starling 63, Bohemian Waxwing 54, Spotted Towhee 8, Song Sparrow 13, Dark-eyed Junco (Ore) 51, Red-Winged Blackbird 26, Brewer's Blackbird 10, House Finch 61, Red Crossbill 98, American Goldfinch 134, Evening Grosbeak 3, and White-Crowned Sparrow 3.
