Checklist of the Flowers of the Princeton Region

2017

Welcome to the enticing world of Similkameen wild flowers. The floral emblem of the Princeton area is the Spring Sunflower, also known as Balsam-root. In early May the south and west-facing hillsides are ablaze with its golden blossoms.

From the earliest flowers that appear as the snow banks recede, such as the Spring Beauty with its white blossoms delicately striped with pink, and the cheerful and very welcome Sagebrush Buttercup, to the autumn-flowering Michaelmas Daisy, there is a tremendous variety of colour and form to be enjoyed all summer long by appreciative visitors.

One of our most conspicuous wild flowers is the Menzies penstemon that surprises everyone by making a great show of colour on an apparently dry rock-face. It has a diminutive cousin that grows on open grassland or among the majestic Ponderosa Pines.

By contrast, the dainty Yellow Bell has a relative, the Chocolate Lily that is well camouflaged by its mottled brown petals, but is all too noticeable by its odor if taken indoors!

It is best to leave the wild flowers where they are, so others can enjoy them and so the plants won't be weakened by removal of their blossoms. Some are rare — they are indeed among Nature's treasures — and we want to give them every chance to flourish in our challenging climate. As you explore for wild flowers, please be careful not to trespass on private land.

The following is a list of some of our wild flowers. They are grouped according to colour. The common name is followed by the botanical name and in some cases by E (early) or L (late). The asterisk following some plant names indicates an invasive species.

This list is meant to be used with a guide book. We used "The Peterson guide to Rocky Mountain wild flowers," "Trees, shrubs and flowers" by C.P. Lyons, "Wild flowers of B.C." by Lewis J. Clark and the final authority was "Plants of Southern Interior British Columbia and the Inland Northwest" by Parish, Coupe & Lloyd.
